A version of AutoCAD for the Apple Macintosh, originally released in 1986, is marketed separately as AutoCAD Drawing. Autodesk offered Zeile a job and in 1981 they purchased his company, Captivate. Autodesk chose to sell to Apple for their ability to market Mac software through the Apple Store rather than through Autodesk's traditional distribution channels. In 1984, Zeile had been trying to get Autodesk to sell CAD software for the Apple II. Although it was too late for 1982, Zeile believed that a new generation of desktop personal computers (most notably the Apple Macintosh) would be marketed primarily with software. Zeile had discovered a developer, the company he had founded, who was able to write CAD software for the new wave of personal computers. This developer, called "Pillar", was able to port the Captivate software to run on the Apple Macintosh. It was so successful that Autodesk purchased Pillar in 1985 for \$10 million.[1] This software was subsequently rebranded as AutoCAD in 1986.[2] Autodesk sold Pillar in 1987 to 3D Systems and later sold AutoCAD to Corel.[3] AutoCAD is used by a large number of people throughout the world, from large companies to small businesses to government agencies, and has been used in several films. It was used to provide the animation, digitized sets, 3D scanning, and photo-realistic models for the fictional town of Radnor, Pennsylvania, in the 2000 film, The Perfect Storm, where most of the filming took place in the village of Nags Head, North Carolina.
